









Read Write Inc. Phonics daily lessons

















Progress groups


- Group children by phonic stages.

- Re-assess all children every half term.








What can I do?

Ask your child to read the sounds and words before they read the story.

They will enjoy teaching you to read these words too.

What can I do?

When your child reads the story, encourage them to read the word using **Special Friends, Fred Talk, Read the Word** if they hesitate or read it incorrectly.

Praise them when they succeed.

Read back each sentence or page to keep the plot moving.

Avoid making it a chore. Encourage your child and tell them you can't wait to hear them read. You know how hard they have been working in school!

Model how to use a storytellers voice.

Ask your child to read every day. Sign their reading diary each time.

Storytime at home

One of the most important things you can do as a parent at home is read books to your child everyday.



Children who love stories want to read for themselves.

Children who read a lot become better readers and writers!





Be a 'talk-a-lot' family

- Talk with your child as much as possible.
- Use new and ambitious vocabulary.
- Build interesting sentences together.




Top Tips - Storytime


- 1. Make it a treat.
- 2. Make it a special quiet time.
- 3. Show curiosity.
- 4. Read story once without stopping.
- 5. Chat about the story.
- 6. Avoid testing with questions.
- 7. Link to other stories and experiences.
- 8. Read favourites over and over again.
- 9. Use different voices.
- 10.Love the book.



What is the Phonics Screening Check?

- A word-reading test at the end of Year 1.
- Children read 40 words.








Ways you can help at home

How do I use the Virtual Classroom?

- 1. Set aside 10 minutes to watch a film with your child throughout the week.
- 2. Find a quiet space for your child to watch the film on a laptop or tablet.
- 3. Praise your child as they join in with the lesson make it fun!

The more they practise using these films, the quicker they'll learn to read.
