Privacy Notice for Primary Pupils (LLT)

This short Privacy Notice is about how your school keeps information about you safe. It helps you know what the school does with this information and why they need it.

Your school has to follow some rules called the Data Protection Act and UK General Data Protection Regulation (UK GDPR). If you want to know all the details, you can ask your school for the full Privacy Notice.

Why We Collect and Use Information About You

The school needs to know some things about you to help you learn, keep you safe, and follow the law. Here are some reasons why we collect and use your information:

Privacy Notice for Primary Pupils (LLT)

- To help you learn better.
- To see how you're doing in school.
- To make sure you're safe and looked after.
- To help make decisions about school funding.
- To check how well the school is doing.
- To let you take tests and record your achievements.
- To follow the law (like child protection and health and safety).
- To check how you use the school's computers and internet safely.
- To share information with others when the law says we have to or should do.

Under the UK GDPR, there are some reasons (or “legal bases”) that let schools use your information:

- Consent (6a): Sometimes, your school will ask you or your parents for permission to use your information. If you say yes, then the school can use it.
- A Legal obligation (6c): There are some rules and laws that your school must follow. To follow these rules, they might need to use your information.
- A duty to safeguard pupils (6d): Your school has to make sure you are safe and looked after. They might need to use your information to help do this.
- Public task (6e): Your school has some important jobs to do for the public, like helping you learn. They might need to use your information to do these jobs.

There are also some special types of information that need extra care. For example, your ethnicity or your medical information.

Here are the reasons your school can use this special information:

- Explicit consent (9.2a): Your school will ask you or your parents for clear permission to use this special information.
- Employment and social protection (9.2b): The school might need to use this information to follow some rules about jobs and social protection.
- Protecting vital interests (9.2c): If it's really important to protect someone's life, your school might need to use this special information.
- Legal claims (9.2f): If the school has to protect itself in a legal situation, they might need to use this special information.
- Substantial public interest (9.2g): If it's very important for the public, your school might need to use this special information.
- Archiving purposes (9.2j): Your school might need to keep this special information for a long time for important public reasons.

For information about crimes, your school follows Article 10 of the UK GDPR.

How We Collect & Keep Your Information Safe

We get your information when you join the school, from forms or from your old school. We might also get information from your parents.

Who We Share Your Information With

Sometimes we share your information with other people or places, like:

- The school you go to after you leave us.
- Our local council.
- The Department for Education (DfE).
- The people who make and check tests (Standards and Testing Agency).
- People who help to make sure you're safe (like Children's Social Care).
- Professionals who visit the school to help you (like Educational Psychologists).
- The police, if needed.
- The NHS (National Health Service).
- Companies that we work with to help the school run better.
- Groups that help our school.

Asking About Your Personal Information

You and your parents can ask to see the information we have about you. If you want to see this information, you can talk to someone at your school or contact DPO@schoolpro.uk.

You might also have other rights depending on why we're using your information.

Changing Your Mind and Making a Complaint

If we asked for your permission to use your information, you can change your mind later.

If you're not happy with how we're using your information, we've made it easier for you to let us know. You can talk to a trusted adult at school, and we'll make sure to reply within 30 days and look into your concern carefully.
